Pastor's Page, May 2019

"To whom shall we go?"

You may have noticed that we have returned to the "alleluia verse" as the Gospel Acclamation in our worship service. Prior to the reading of the gospel, we sing:

"Alleluia! Lord to whom shall we go? You have the words of eternal life. Alleluia!"

The question within that verse is Peter's. You see, the Lord on many occasions displeased--confused, scandalized, rebuked, and burdened—his disciples with words and actions. As a result, many departed from him. The attitude of the ones who stayed with him was represented in the gospel by Peter's question and confession of faith "To whom shall we go? You have the words of eternal life."

We have entered the season of Easter. The days of Holy Week were full of the agonizing events of our Lord's passion. With the other seasons of the church year, we receive the whole gospel: the sometimes hard, offensive, and forthrightly delivered words of the Lord and his apostles, along with the positive, comforting, and joyful ones....that resound definitively in the Easter proclamation.

Yet, there is something profound about Peter's question. It reflects something of the depth and tenacity and challenge of Easter faith. It tells us something about what is required to follow Jesus. It seems he did almost everything he could <u>not</u> to please his followers, but to challenge them. He tested them, by applying his truth, to find and bring to light <u>something</u> deep within that sought the very One who had called them, persevered with him when he met the hostility of a world against him, and felt remorse when their sin and fear separated them from him. He did this to open their eyes to the gravity of the mission to which he as calling them and stiffen their spines for the storms and stress of Kingdom work in his name.

Regarding their Kingdom work in Jesus' name, as is the case for us, the world offers no incentive or help. What is needed is the conviction born of the power of our Christ's life of love and mercy. He not only has the words of eternal life. He is the Word of life, lavishly and eternally offered for us on our pilgrim way. This conviction is anchored and supremely validated in the events which we have celebrated and now live in the light of anew.

As the writer of the book of Hebrews proclaims: "Since then we have a great high priest who has passed through the heavens, Jesus, the Son of God, let us hold fast our confession. For we do not have a high priest who is unable to sympathize with our weaknesses, but one who in every respect has been tempted as we are yet without sin. Let us then with confidence draw near to the throne of grace, that we may receive mercy and fine grace to help in time of need."

So...onward we go! And with full-throated praise, let us do so, singing:

Rise, shine, you people! Christ the Lord has entered

Our human story; God in him is centered.

He comes to us, death and sin surrounded, with grace unbounded.

A Monthly Resource from the Southeastern Minnesota Synod

"What is God Up To?" by Presiding Bishop Elizabeth Eaton

What is to be done? Our congregations are growing older and smaller. At least 40 percent of our congregations have an average weekly worship attendance of 50 or less. ELCA membership decreases by 70,000 people a year, or roughly the loss of a synod per year. Clergy retirements outnumber new candidates for ministry. Financial pressures and building maintenance create stress. There is a dearth of people in their 20s and 30s in our pews. How do we change this? How do we reverse the trends?

These are anxious questions that come from anxious people across this church. We aren't the only ones asking them—just about every mainline denomination, including the non-Latino population of the Roman Catholic Church, is in the same boat. Even some megachurches are showing signs of plateau or decline. And this is not exclusive to the Christian community. I once attended a national conference of Muslims where one workshop was titled "Un-Mosqued to Mosqued: How to Get the Young Muslim Back to the Masjid." Some now see the decline of the church in general, and the ELCA in particular, as inevitable. The response can be to turn our churches into bunkers with our congregations sheltering within the walls or to try every new program that breathlessly promises to attract people to our congregations. Neither is an effective or faithful long-term strategy.

I think we are asking the wrong questions. The questions we are asking have to do about us: "What can we do?" They express loss and grief and fear—loss and grief for what we were and fear about what we will become. Not only do these questions not lead to productive answers, they also don't point to hope. It's as if the church's one foundation rests on us and our efforts.

I think we need to ask: "What is God up to?" It's clear to me that we are living in a time of transition, especially for the Western church. I don't know how long this transition will last nor do I have a clear vision of what the church is becoming.

I think we are asking the wrong questions. ... I think we need to ask: "What is God up to?" The good news is that you and I don't have to have a clear vision because God does. "Do not remember the former things, or consider the things of old. I am about to do a new thing; now it springs forth, do you not perceive it?" (Isaiah 43:18-19). These words of hope were spoken to the Jews who were stuck in exile. They had lost their land, their temple and their king—the pillars of their identity. Likewise, the church has lost social status and relevance in 21st-century American culture.

For Israel and the church this would be a hopeless situation, except that God is faithful. When the Lord admonished, "Do not remember the former things, or consider the things of old," this wasn't a command to forget God's past saving work, but to believe that God was still acting. This is true for us today. When we stop asking what we can do to fix the church and start asking what God is up to, we open ourselves up to the life-giving promise of God's future.

Then we are also open to more questions: How is the Spirit reshaping the church? How will Christ use us as Christ's living body in the world? If we want to attract people to our congregations to rebuild a memory, God will not bless our efforts. But if we—grabbed by the Spirit in baptism, changed by the word, intimately and lovingly connected to Jesus and each other in communion, and set free by grace to serve the neighbor—invite all people into true life, then we shall become part of the answer. This takes attention and devotion. Worship, prayer, Scripture study, generosity and service—not in order to save the church, but in response to the new life God has given us in Christ.

And one more thing: in God's inscrutable wisdom, God has chosen human hands and voices to tell and welcome. Let's adopt the Metropolitan Washington, D.C., Synod's mission to get more people to know more about Jesus.
