Dubbed as it is, the "Pastor's Page," this is installment #2, with no more to follow.

Part 2: Story and Song

I grew up in a home where Sacred Writ was believed because of the God who it revealed. And the church was the community of that God; a God revealed in "the story of Israel and its Jesus, told as a message of final destiny" (Lutheranism, by Robert Jenson and Eric Gritsch).

Because of my father's and mother's love of music, the over aching biblical drama often came to me in the medium of music, both hymnody and choral, more so even than in biblical texts. I still find myself singing those powerfully moving renditions of biblical truth during the day, and surely in times of trouble and extreme joy. I am still drawn by the way in which they serve to help proclaim the hope we have in Jesus Christ. These are some of the hymns that have shaped me: "O That I Had a Thousand Voices," "My Hope is Built on Nothing Less," "O God Our Help in Ages Past," "Guide Me Ever, Great Redeemer," Praise to the Lord," "O Day Full of Grace, and the list could go on and on. At an early age, I was steeped in the church's worship and grew to appreciate the entire liturgy of the Holy Communion as the spiritual anchor for life lived from day to day. As a singer in choirs in high school and college, I continued to learn the faith through anthems and spirituals from the great composers and arrangers of the church's sacred music; J. S. Bach, Palestrina, Heinrich Schutz, Benjamin Britten, William Dawson, Carolyn and Kenneth Jennings, Paul J. Christianson, and so many more. They all made their mark on me. They gave the gospel to my ears and, one and the same, to my voice: the gospel of Jesus Christ, crucified and risen from the dead. I owe them a debt of eternal gratitude for the gift I will sing to the end of my earthly sojourn and on into life in the eternal church. For "through church with the song goes on....."

Dear friends of the Haiti ministry of Pastor Mioche Rock,

With the season of VBS arriving (along with other great MN summer traditions) I reached out to Pastor Mioche to see what we might be able to do as part of VBS to be of help to the students in Haiti.

He shared that his greatest need right now is for money to replace teacher desks and chairs and buy books for students. More details to follow.

To provide a desk and chair will cost apx. \$500. Yes, we could get something cheaper here, but he is not purchasing them here. Also, these classrooms are used by the general public (like our fellowship halls) and the desks become table and so much more, so the desk and chairs need to be extra sturdy. He needs a total of 11 sets for classrooms, principal and media room.

To provide a year's book for one student is \$50. Parents need to provide the books and about 60% can't. About 250 students will be short of books when school starts in Bouyaha Haiti in the fall. Students share as possible.

In Haiti, as in many countries in the world, there are no free public schools and this is why 60-70% of adult Haitians cannot read. Pastor Mioche charges no tuition for his school AND provides a meal nearly every day there is class. He cannot pay for books too. Haiti like many countries in the world does not have a history of the school owning the books and lending them to the students for many years of use. Also most books are workbook and text in one so handing them down does not work.

I know gathering money instead of pencils is not as rewarding for the students, but it is so necessary. Here at Saint Paul Lutheran, working with the Education staff, I'm hoping we can set up some highly visual enticements to give to the book fund. We have a highly underused library and I am hoping we can make a pile of books from our library to represent each set of student books offerings come in for. I plan to place the piles of books in high traffic places so adults may be encouraged to support the offering too.

We Belong to the Truth

"Let your word be 'Yes, Yes' or "No, No' " (Matthew 5:37).

When I was a girl, dinner table discussions in our family were lively. We could state our position on an issue, but then we had to be ready to back up our argument with facts. In that pre-Google time, the World Book Encyclopedia was often our source. Out came the dark blue volumes. Their very weight and color brought gravitas. One's presentation could be critiqued, but not the facts—they were printed in the World Book Encyclopedia after all!

Those were simpler times, or maybe I was just more naïve. Now we live in the era of "truthiness" and "fake news" and "alternative facts." One prominent attorney declared in an interview: "Truth is not truth." I was stunned when I heard that, but even more stunned when I realized he had a point.

We have weaponized facts and forced truth into the service of spin. Often conversations are no longer the exchange of ideas and convictions but barrages of accusations. It is not enough to let our word be "yes, yes" or "no, no." Now we need to shade and embellish and selectively "factify" our position. And if that doesn't work, then shout or use ALL CAPS.

Jesus and Pilate have an interesting exchange about truth in the Gospel of John. "[Jesus said]: 'For this I was born, and for this I came into the world, to testify to the truth. Everyone who belongs to the truth listens to my voice.' Pilate asked him, 'What is truth?'" (John 18:37-38). A remarkable claim by Jesus and an interesting reply by Pilate. I wonder, was Pilate earnestly seeking for truth or was he cynically dismissing the existence of truth? Are we, followers of Jesus, able to listen to Jesus' voice?

So how do we live as people of Truth in a time of spin? We need to return daily to the new creation God made us when we were baptized. Our new life in Christ is our foundation and our horizon, our beginning and our end. An ancient Celtic blessing puts it this way: "God to enfold me, God to surround me, God in my speaking, God in my thinking."

In baptism God has claimed us as beloved children joined to the death and resurrection of Christ, sealed by the Spirit and marked with the cross of Christ forever. Baptism makes a difference and makes us different. We now belong to the Truth. That doesn't mean we have the Truth or even know everything about truth. The Truth doesn't belong to us. No, by God's gracious act we belong to the Truth. We don't make truth claims—Truth claims us.

How then do we live? In deep humility, profound gratitude and real joy.

Humility: It is God's good and gracious favor to be merciful to all, even, and perhaps especially, to those with whom we fervently disagree. This is the severe mercy of grace—no one, not even those we determine are beyond the pale, is beyond the reach of God.

Gratitude: God claims us. We are not our own and we are not alone. Paul wrote: "For while we were still weak ... for if while we were enemies, we were reconciled to God through the death of his Son" (Romans 5:6-10). The deep human struggle for worth and meaning is over. We are the beloved of the Most High, thanks be to God.

Joy: Dear church, we are free! Free to love, free to serve, free to listen, free to be challenged. We can "lay aside every weight and the sin that clings so closely and ... run with perseverance the race that is set before us" (Hebrews 12:1).

Here is my prayer: There is a lot of noise in this world, gracious God, including our own that lays claim to the truth. Bring us to a place of stillness where we can listen to you. Your truth has claimed us and set us free. Amen.
